## 1. Welcome

This document is presented prior to the next public meeting for the Cambourne Area which is to be held at 7.30pm on Wednesday 17<sup>th</sup> June 2015 at Haslingfield Village Hall and is open to everyone. Crime and ASB data for your neighbourhood can also be found at [www.police.uk](http://www.police.uk). The aims of a panel meeting are:

- For the Police to highlight emerging or concerning trends in crime and anti-social behaviour, and be available to discuss these in a public forum.
- To listen and take note of concerns presented by individuals, Parish Councils, volunteer organisations such as Neighbourhood and Speed Watch, elected members and other residents or local associations.
- For the panel to decide areas of concern for the community and Police to prioritise as part of local Policing activities.
- To provide an update on the actions taken in regards to previously chosen priorities or other emerging trends.

## 3. Update on activities during the previous period

Inspector Hiron explained at the last panel meeting that our priorities focus on protecting the vulnerable, in particular in relation to child sexual exploitation; domestic abuse; crimes targeted at elderly or vulnerable such as rogue trading, scams or internet fraud and human trafficking offences.

### Recent Team Safeguarding Activities

51 vulnerable adult referrals, relating to some of the most vulnerable individuals within our community, have been received and reviewed at Cambourne Station during the last 4 months. Your local team play a pivotal role in ensuring follow up enquiries are made and for monitoring the development of appropriate support to these residents. By working with partners in the medical and mental health services and housing providers, we aim to implement appropriate safeguarding for them and reduce the risk of them suffering harm or being targeted by criminals in their own home. Additional benefits of this work are wider community reassurance in some cases, and a generally reduced calls for service on agencies which enables the needs of more residents to be dealt with more efficiently.

We have also continued to focus on our work with young people and schools, in line with the Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnership priorities, with safeguarding presentations at Gamlingay First School and Village College, Barrington School and Comberton Village College. To improve this area of our work, we are in the process of developing a standardised, co-operative approach to the delivery of Safeguarding information with our colleagues in the County Council Locality Team.

In a similar vein, officers from both the Complex Case and PCSO Teams from Cambourne have continued in their regular attendance at Child in Need and Family Intervention Programme meetings, to identify and support the best strategies in dealing with vulnerable young people within the community.

The safeguarding of children is frequently linked with domestic violence and a particularly involved and challenging case has recently been dealt with relating to a family in Cambourne. Complex Case Team officers assisted Circle Wherry Housing in obtaining an injunction under the Housing Act against the male partner of a tenant following offences and ASB towards neighbours. The situation subsequently developed into a domestic violence investigation which resulted in the arrest of the male, followed by a further – more stringent- injunction and non-molestation order against him. Now separated and protected from the male, the other of the children is now positively engaging with the multi-agency Child in Need process.

### **Concerns relating to drug use in Gamlingay**

In March we were notified by a resident of concerns regarding the public use of cannabis in the vicinity of Robinson Court. We responded with patrols to target this behaviour which, following an early Formal Cannabis Warning, significantly brought the situation under control. PCSO John Coppard conducted an ASB survey with all local residents and this helped us gain more insight into the main individuals involved. This was followed up with South Cambs District Council and Sanctuary Housing joint visits to the relevant addresses resulting in tenancy warning letters being issued, and one resident being subsequently rehoused elsewhere.

As a result of this activity we were also able to conduct safeguarding work relating to both child welfare and assisting in the relocation of two vulnerable residents to more appropriate accommodation. Whilst reports have abated, with no further offending being encountered, we continue to monitor the area for possible dispersal of cannabis use to adjacent farmland. This is an excellent example of how we can achieve rapid results with the support of the community and partner agencies.

Following a drugs warrant executed at The Cross last November, a male has now pleaded guilty to possession of two disguised prohibited weapons and possession of cannabis with intent to supply offences and is due to be sentenced at Crown Court in July.

### **Anti-Social Behaviour**

As the table at the end of this document attests, our area remains a very safe place to live and work with a 39% decrease in reported ASB compared with the same period last year. On occasions ASB hot spot develop and our aim is to intercede in a timely manner, deal with the perpetrators in conjunction with our partners, provide reassurance to the Neighbourhood and maintain the Peace.

There have been 5 calls for vehicle related ASB in the High Street car park in Melbourn over the period we have conducted patrols and an ASB survey in support of these concerns. This issue has been discussed with

the Parish and District council and is an agenda item at the Practical Solutions Group. The Parish Council will shortly commence physical improvements to the car park which will should have a significant impact on the ASB issues at the location. We will continue to monitor this location through the summer months for further problems.

In May we had 2 reports of groups of teenagers causing disturbances at the Church and climbing on the surgery roof. In response to these reports a group were located and Guardian Awareness Programme letters were delivered to their guardians to raise our concerns about their behaviour. Such incidents, and those concerned in them, are now routinely discussed at the monthly multi-agency Locality Meetings and frequently link to our safeguarding work with families and individuals discussed at this forum.

Proactive patrolling of previous locations that have seen ASB, and those following concerns raised by the community, such as Barton Recreation Ground, Shepreth car park, Foxton recreation ground car park, Eco Park and Cambourne Business Park are likely to impact on ASB reporting. During these patrols, we have seized small amounts of cannabis and associated paraphernalia.

Certain individuals can also create significant ASB issues for our communities and we have been working on two such cases recently. We have assisted South Cambridgeshire District Council in securing and an ASB Crime and Policing Act 2014 injunction against a male from Melbourn who has a long history of ASB and criminality. When he breached his injunction, Cambourne officers arrested him and he received a suspended prison sentence. Another male, with a long history of ASB and offending, is currently being supported by a multi-agency approach into supported housing which will, hopefully, break over ten years of prison / homeless cycle affecting communities in South Cambs and Cambridge.

There were a series of calls relating to noisy drinkers at the Wheatsheaf PH, Gamlingay in May following an incident of disorder which took place at the location in April. Your local team and SCDC are working together to resolve the issues at the PH and are gathering evidence to establish if there are sufficient grounds to issue a Community Protection Notice.

### **Notable Burglary Results**

Dwelling and non-dwelling burglaries remain a primary concern for the community and significant resources continue to be deployed in the prevention and detection of these offences. It is gratifying to note that between April 2014 and March 2015, dwelling burglary offences have reduced by 4.4%. We currently have the 5 offenders from the Eastern region who are awaiting sentencing for a series of burglaries across the whole of the eastern region including 26 in South Cambridgeshire alone. Additionally, we have two suspects charged and remanded for the aggravated burglary at Coton.

We have also achieved the following excellent prosecution results during this time;

## **Community Safety and South Cambs Business Watch Update**

### **South Cambs Business Watch - PCSO Leanne Fisher**

I have been in the role of now been in the role of South Cambridgeshire Business Watch Officer since February this year. I am an experienced officer having previously covered a number of beat areas in Sawston panel area for 7 years. The main purpose of this role is to work with key businesses that have been identified as priority cases that would benefit from a more detailed response from the force. Any businesses that signs up to South Cambs Business Watch scheme is added to the force neighbourhood alert system so they can receive updates and information that relate to business crime. As well as more general information about events taking place, warning messages, or crime trends.

Activities during this period include;

- 30 new members have been signed up to the scheme since February 2015.
- 2 referrals to Countryside Watch Scheme
- 21 business security surveys carried out to victims of business crime – (12 of which required written surveys) and further follow up work.
- 7 other business victims contacted but did want a survey or any other security advice/help.
- 5 security surveys carried out with Rachel Carr – not business related.
- Working with Ellen Muirhead of Cambridgeshire Countryside Watch visiting South Cambs Businesses promoting SCBW and CSW. We also visit and reassure existing members of both schemes.
- I have also been working with Gemma Dear (Rural Crime PCSO), visiting farms and other rural locations on the South Cambs areas.
- 19 Feb – home security talk given at the David Rayner Centre, Shelford with Rachel Carr.
- 1 April - Collings Brothers, St Neots with Ellen Muirhead (CSW) & Gemma learning about farming equipment and meeting local farmers at the event whilst promoting SCBW and CSW.
- 7/8 April – 2 day vehicle crime initiative. Visiting Hotels across the area, including Melbourn, whose car parks have been victims of vehicle crime specifically theft of tools from Transit vans.
- 13 April – Crime Reduction Event attended by myself and Rachel Carr in Birmingham. A number of crime prevention companies promoting their products, some of which could help businesses in relation crime prevention and will help in my role as SCBW officer.

- Operation Oaklands Specific Event (with Rachel Carr) – Hardwick School on 29 April when we promoted SCBW scheme and provided general security advice, shed alarms and smart water to attendees.

New marketing materials such as the Rural Crime Survey, and Business Crime Survey have been produced to better support rural & agricultural businesses and are now in use by Officer's within the force. Weekly Business Crime updates are sent out to all SCBW members with media alerts on twitter and our blog regarding recent issues including thefts from Transit Vans, Catalytic Converter Thefts and Tack/Equestrian thefts.

Since February to the end of May the main types of business crime being targeted are;

- Building sites – out buildings, porta cabins, metal containers holding power tools inside.
- Businesses with Mercedes Sprinter vans (Cat Converter thefts).
- Business burglaries – a range of different businesses, car garages, retail shops, stables and business park premises.

### **Community Safety – Rachel Carr**

Operation Oaklands – our crime prevention initiative with a particular focus on protecting residents' property from burglary – has continued and in March the format was modified to allow up to 3 weeks in each village. This ensures we maximise our coverage of households and allows us to run up to 3 evening events for those residents who we are not able to meet during other times. Villages visited in the Cambourne Area during this period comprise Harston, Hauxton, Barton, Gamlingay, Hardwick and Haslingfield and there has been an excellent response to our provision of our security checks and items such as shed and window alarms at cost price, plus Smartwater coding kits at a reduced price. We have also established a fortnightly Police Contact Point in Morrison's supermarket which, in addition to allowing shoppers to raise any issues they may have with one of the Cambourne team, has also been useful in support Op Oaklands.

Smartwater signs, for displaying at the entry to these villages, are available if Parish Councils wish to contact me. I have attended a number of evening surgeries to support Operation Oaklands activity in South Cambs.

A No Cold Calling Zone was set up 7 March 2015 together with Cambridgeshire Trading Standards in Elin Way, Meldreth following reports of cold callers and rogue trading in the area.

I have conducted 32 security visits to private households since 24 Feb 2015. Plus 19 visits to business premises. These include victims of burglary, rogue trading, or theft. Following a visit a number of individuals were referred for further help from organisations such as the Bobby Scheme, Fire Service, or Community Navigator Scheme. I have also provided talks for local groups and organisations regarding doorstep crime and home security.

Social media, is also used to get security and crime prevention messages out, including articles for the South Cambs blog, press releases, sending Neighbourhood Alert/ Ecops messages, and using twitter when appropriate. Media messages have been sent out regarding Rogue Trading incidents, shed and garage burglaries, vehicle crime, including details of a national series targeting transit vans.

### **Rural Crime update – Gemma Dear Rural Crime PCSO**

Rural Crime training has now been completed in South Cambs, Fenland and Peterborough and we are currently working on the Huntingdon and East Cambs areas receiving theirs. Officers from the areas including reactive, Detectives, PCSO's and the local council and fire service have attended the on the farm training and are now fully aware of security marking systems for agricultural machinery, the impact of crime on farm businesses and identifying equipment and their serial numbers etc.

Normal daily work continues between Ellen Muirhead (CSW) and I, visiting victims of crime and offering security advice and reassurance.

Rural related crime is down in the South Cambs area in general, but we have seen a slight rise in tack and horse equipment theft. I have been working with Herts and Northants sharing intelligence on possible offenders and this remains an ongoing project.

I attended the National Rural Crime Seminar, which was held in Birmingham, and took lots of ideas taken from it, which are being progressed by CI Sutherland.

National Rural Crime Network. PCC has signed Cambridgeshire Constabulary up and a rural crime survey is being sent around to rural community residents to assist the network in forming an accurate picture of the national rural crime issues. The survey can be found on the website of the NRCN.

Cambridgeshire Countryside watch are holding a Pleasure horse ride around the Wimpole and Kingston estates. Monies raised will go towards the work carried out by the CCW coordinators. It's being held of Sunday 5<sup>th</sup> July and details with entry forms can be found on the Cambridgeshire Horsecwatch Facebook page or in your local feed merchant or tack shop.

Rural Crime Team attended the Cambridgeshire County show at Wimpole and the officers met a lot of people and were gratefully received.

Leanne and I attended the Open Day at Collings Brothers with Ellen Muirhead. A good afternoon catching up with the farming community.

Op Armitage meetings. This is an operation targeting stack fire offenders. It's a joint working group between the Fire Service, Police and local straw contractors targeting the prevention of the fires and prosecution of offenders. Very successful operation as we have reduced the fires by nearly 90% since the start and the fire service have put many youths through the Consequences of Fire course, with one individual ending up at Crown Court at only 14 years old for a stack they set fire too last year.

The PCC outreach worker Rebecca Avery was shown the rural sights of South Cambs in March. We introduced her to a few farmers in the area of different farming backgrounds so she had a full picture of rural farming life.

Patrols have been carried out on the rivers and lakes looking for fish poachers. 2 people have been caught and reported for offences on the river at Duxford. The patrols have been carried out by our dedicated Rural Special Constables.

### **Speeding & Parking Concerns**

Speeding is regularly raised by all communities as a concern which is why we have established the South Cambs Speed team who carry out speed checks on roads where members of the public highlight issues of speeding. They do this via our website link <http://tinyurl.com/SCSpeedTeam>.

During this period a total of 89 traffic offences have been processed by officers deployed across the Cambourne Area which include 46 for speeding and 7 for mobile phone usage. Safety Camera Van deployments identified a further 59 speeding offences.

### **Community Speedwatch and South Cambs Speed Team Update**

County Speedwatch Co-ordinator Brian Robins and Special Constable Paul Jenkins have continued with the work in response to these concerns, supported by colleagues from across the Command. Brian provides the following update;

In the last quarter we have introduced 21 new Speedwatch teams into the scheme, we are now up to 220 teams County wide. The average number of volunteers per team is 6. We have lost one team whose coordinator was unable to accept the updated operating procedures, however the village volunteers are looking to rebuild the team with a new coordinator.

The Constabulary has appointed 3 Police Service Volunteers who will shortly take over some of the area teams, I will continue to manage the South Cambs Teams as well as support the new area coordinators. We have been trialling a new lightweight kit which seems to be receiving favourable reviews. The new lightweight pop up signs are very popular with the teams and much easier to erect.

In the last three months the South Cambs village teams have checked 11,103 vehicles passing through check sites, 1091 of those have been detected exceeding the ACPO guideline speed limits (24/35/46) and 848 letters were sent to traceable registered owners (we do not pursue leased/hired vehicles).

A number of locations identified by CSW teams have been targeted for enforcement by the #SCSpeedteam, Local Policing Teams and the Roads Policing Unit have issued Traffic Offence Reports for speeding, seatbelt & mobile phone offences as well as document offences, with some vehicles seized as a result of stops for excess speed. This targeted approach has proved successful in other parts of the county where CSW operates as well.

#### 4. Local Team Update

The PCSO team at Cambourne provide the Community with a point of contact and will be available to deal general queries relating to their areas. Following the changes to the team reported in the last panel document some of our villages have been re-aligned to one of our team as follows;

- PCSO David Jackson – Cambourne, Bourn, Caxton, Croxton, Eltisley, Caldecote & Hardwick
- PCSO Alex Giltinane – Childerley, Kingston, Toft, Barton, Coton, Grantchester, Madingley, Comberton, Gt Eversden, Lt Eversden, Haslingfield, Harlton, Harston & Hauxton.
- PCSO John Coppard – Gamlingay, Lt Gransden, Longstowe, Hatley, Arrington, Croydon, Orwell, Barrington & Wimpole
- PCSO James Lynch – Bassingbourn Ward
- PCSO Lindsay Gardiner – Melbourn Ward

Their deployments will be prioritised by the need to provide Safeguarding for Vulnerable People, followed by Crime Prevention and Investigation activity. All our officers will be deployed to the areas of acutest need irrespective of their areas of geographical responsibilities. Our staff are now issued with electronic notepads will enable them to spend more time working in the community rather than having to return to the police station to perform administrative duties and will use any community Wi-Fi hot spots to enhance their visibility and availability within our communities.

#### 5. Local concerns raised via Parish Councils/Neighbourhood Watch

The following items have been received from Parish Councils and NHW as current concerns;

- Cambourne Area Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator Vic Nickson has raised the issue of fraudulent telephone scams. This is a growing area of criminal activity nationally and is too large a subject to be adequately covered within this document. ## 6. Partner Agencies Update

The Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnership (CDRP) has agreed the following priorities for 2015-16:

- Child sexual exploitation including grooming via the internet and child-on-child offences (e.g. 'sexting' and domestic abuse within teenage relationships).
- Domestic abuse between adults.
- Crimes targeted at the elderly or other vulnerable members of the community including rogue trading, distraction offences and internet fraud.
- Human trafficking including forced labour, workplace exploitation and sexual exploitation.

These priorities will be reflected in the Cambourne Policing Team's activities with the related safeguarding activity providing the primary focus of operational deployment of officers across the Command.
